Reflections from Tom



Advent is one of my favorite seasons of the Christian year. But I will also tell you that an appreciation of the beauty and simplicity of Advent was not something that came easily for me. It was much easier to throw myself enthusiastically into the spirit of Christmas as soon as I had pushed myself away from the Thanksgiving table. I seemed to relish being surrounded and bombarded by the various subliminal messages that enticed me to come and experience the promise and joy of Christmas in ways that I could never have imagined. The problem was that by the time I got to Christmas, I was exhausted from the wild chase.

Advent is very different. Advent begins from our experience as the days become shorter and our lives encounter the darkness that surrounds us. Advent begins very darkly and very quietly and moves toward that grand crescendo of expectation and hope in an incarnation of God's presence so monumental that neither heaven nor earth could contain the joy and light of his coming. Like each of the seasons of the Christian year, Advent uses the rich resources of Scripture – the Testaments, the Psalms, and sometimes the Apocrypha to weave a story that is similar in nature to an orchestra that pulls together the various elements and cadences of music to create a vast and complex symphony – simple enough for the hearing of a child, while at the same time amazingly profound and majestic in its meaning.

Advent is a season of expectation. That is what the word "advent" means. We expect something to come, and that expectation is the coming of Jesus, the birth of the Christ child. But why do we do that? What is there about our nature that causes us to return to the birth of this child year after year? I think it has to do once again with our experience of darkness. It is, on the one hand, the visceral reality of darkness. But I think it also has to do with the images of darkness that are a very real part of our lives and of the human condition. Jesus is the light that breaks through the darkness that surrounds our lives. Jesus is the fulfillment of the longing that somehow our lives and the lives of others in the world might find meaning in the light of him who comes to dispel the darkness. But we need to acknowledge that darkness before the light really begins to make sense, and that is what advent is all about.

Advent begins with a solitary light. By the time Christmas Eve arrives, all four of the Advent candles and the Christ candle in its center are lit, a symbolic reminder that Christ comes once again into our lives and into the world – a light in the midst of darkness. On that Christmas night, the heavens were ablaze with light, and the world of heavenly hosts and humble shepherds together rejoiced in its brilliance, and so do we!

A blessed Advent and Merry Christmas to all!
